Earlview aims to create a happy, ordered and stimulating environment, which will facilitate the development of each child's potential. Combinations of modern and traditional methods are used within a broad, balanced and challenging curriculum. Interactive whiteboards, iPads and Apple TV in all classes bring our teaching and learning to life.

The content of the curriculum is determined by the Northern Ireland Curriculum in each of the following compulsory subjects:

- Language and Literacy
- The Arts
- Mathematics and Numeracy
- The World Around Us
- Personal Development and Mutual Understanding

The teachers have worked very hard in their effort to implement the curriculum and to draw up the school policy documents and schemes of work for each year group.

In accordance with the requirements of the Northern Ireland Curriculum pupils will also cover Cross Curricular Skills, Thinking Skills and Personal Capabilities, largely through the study of the above compulsory subjects:

Class teachers aim to allow for differences in abilities and other characteristics of children in their classes. Children will therefore progress through the curriculum at different rates.

There is regular ongoing review and update of school policies and schemes to ensure our children are able to think both critically and creatively, skills important in an ever changing world.





2 Keeping you informed

From School

A weekly Newsletter will be sent home every Friday with each child in the school and nursery, which will contain details of, for example, forthcoming events. Please retain these Newsletters for your information. These notes are also available on the school website: www.earlviewprimary.co.uk Other notes may be sent home from time-to-time so please remember to check your child's schoolbag. Your child will also receive a class newsletter twice a term to let you know details of class activities and topics to help you work with your child at home. Early in the autumn term you will be invited to a parent information morning with the class teacher where class structures and curricular details will be discussed. Other curricular meetings are arranged as required.

Twice a year you will have an opportunity to meet with your child's teacher to discuss your child's progress and to view his/her work. However, if you have any worries, however minor, please do not hesitate to discuss your concerns with the teacher or Principal before then. It is recommended that, where possible, you make an appointment to meet with your child's teacher. If you have to speak to your child's class teacher during class time, please report to the Principal/Vice Principal.

You will receive written reports on your child's progress once a year. Parents may be invited to school by the Principal/Class Teacher to discuss a pupil's progress at any time throughout the year if deemed helpful.

From Home

If your child is absent or late, you are required to inform the school of the reasons. As parents, once you enrol your child in a school you are required by law to ensure that he/she attends unless he/she is sick or there are other extraneous circumstances. All pupils are expected to take part in activities such as P.E. and swimming.

If there are any circumstances at home, which may affect your child in school, please inform us in confidence so that we can take them into account.

It is important that we are notified immediately of any changes that occur in the information you give us regarding your child's home address, contact telephones, health problems etc.

Pupil involvement

Pupils are encouraged to share their views and opinions about their learning in class through class discussions and a regular "Tea Party" with the Principal.

Extra Curricular Activities

Earlview considers that extra-curricular activities add a valuable dimension to the education of the pupils through raising children's confidence, self-esteem and also developing new and lasting friendships. These clubs have included staging musical performances, football, games, revision, first aid (Heart Start), music lessons, computers, hockey, booster, eco-club, art and drama.

As an Extended School, we provided the following:

- Breakfast Club from 8.10am costing £1 per day
- After School Day Care costing £2 per hour (Available 1.45pm – 4pm)
- Foundation Stage play area open to supervised Earlview pupils from 1.45 – 4.30pm
- Conservation Area open to parents throughout the day

Educational Visits

Every year classes will take part in at least one educational visit, with some of the older children having a residential trip.



Beyond the classroom

In Earlview we are very fortunate to have the support of our local community with many of our pupils coming from the local area. However our catchment area has greatly increased recently with pupils now travelling from Belfast, Rathcoole, Ballyduff, Straid, Ballyclare, Carrickfergus, Glengormley and Greenisland.

Our recent inspection report, highlighting the "outstanding" teaching has given people a firm basis to send their children to us even if they have to travel some distance. Our proximity to Mossley West Train Station means that some parents leave their children in to our Breakfast Club before catching a train. Within it's Christian ethos, Earlview Primary School welcomes all children, irrespective of faith.

> **Playing** and learning



The unit is staffed by a fully qualified Nursery teacher and Assistant. We currently offer 26 full time places. The building is spacious and bright and furnished with a wide range of equipment to provide a happy and stimulating environment in which your child may gain independence, develop initiative, make decisions and solve problems.

In Earlyiew Nursery, we believe that:

- Childhood is a stage of life in its own right, to be enjoyed. It is not merely a preparation for something else yet to come.
- Children have individual differences and needs, which must be recognised. A child is not wrong because he/she is different.
- There is a natural curiosity, sense of wonder and amazement in each child, which needs to be fostered.
- Children need to be actively involved as they learn more quickly from real tasks.
- Young children need encouragement and help to learn how to learn.
- A child's understanding comes slowly trailing behind knowledge.
- The nursery education rests with his/her parents/ carers. The home influence should be supported and strengthened as we build on whatever he/she brings from home to school.
- Children are weaned into the wider social group of school and thus into the wider world

Our Aims

- We aim to provide opportunities for the child to grow in self-confidence, experience success and develop a good self-image.
- We aim to provide opportunities for the child to practice and understand social skills and to be able to communicate his/her thoughts and feelings to other adults and his/her peers.
- We aim to provide opportunities for the child to become aware of his/her environment and to explore a wide range of materials creatively, allowing him/her to express them selves appropriately.
- We aim to provide opportunities for the child to share in the wonder and excitement created by books, stories and rhymes.
- We aim to encourage the child to develop at his/her own rate through challenging, progressive play.
- We aim to provide opportunities for the child to practice and understand social skills and to be able to communicate his/her thoughts and feelings to other adults and his/her peers.
- We aim to involve parents/carers, thus bridging the gap between home and school and allowing each child the opportunity of reaching his/her full potential.
- · Our Nursery Unit recognises that it reflects the needs of the community and does not exist in a vacuum.



In Earlview Nursery your child will have opportunities to:

- form relationships/make friends
- work with others in a group
- share toys/tools and take turns
- use a wider range of language
- listen for longer periods
- concentrate for longer periods
- express thoughts, feelings, ideas and needs
- learn to create and express themselves through art
- explore early mathematical and scientific concepts
- develop co-ordination and gross and fine motor skills
- become aware of their place in the world

Health Matters

During your child's time in Primary School a medical examination is carried out and children can be referred for further treatment if necessary. Please make us

Homework

Homework encourages pupils to develop the skills an insight into what is happening in the classroom and enables you to share in your child's learning.

Pastoral Care Policy



If any changes are made to the above times, you will receive written notification.

Please ensure that your child arrives on time. He/she should not arrive before 8.50 am (unless attending the Breakfast Club) since there will not be anyone on supervisory duty. Children will not be permitted to leave the school grounds without the permission of the Principal or Vice Principal or unless a written request has been received from the parent or the parent calls personally to the school. Only those children who go home for lunch will be permitted to leave the school grounds at lunchtime.

School Meals

School meals are cooked on site in our superbly equipped kitchen. The meals are served in our dining hall with menus being provided in advance. All meals are prepared in line with Government's most recent nutritional guidelines. Application forms for pupils entitled to free school meals are available from the school secretary. Those who bring a packed lunch will be supervised while they eat.
